College Overview

Catholic College Bendigo is a co-educational Secondary College. The College is governed by the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of Australia & Papua New Guinea (ISMAPNG) through Mercy Education Limited.

Mercy Education Limited (Mercy Education) is an incorporated ministry of the Sisters of Mercy of Australia and Papua New Guinea (ISMAPNG), charged with operating all educational ministries over which the Institute holds complete sponsorship. Mercy Education is one of the many works operated by the Institute throughout Australia and Papua New Guinea.

Mercy Education will operate at all times as part of the mission of the Catholic Church in conformity with canon law and in strict conformity with the ethical framework of the Institute as determined by the Institute Leader and Council from time to time.

ISMAPNG is involved with twelve fully sponsored schools - eight in Victoria, three in Western Australia and one in South Australia. The governance role of the Board of Mercy Education is confined to the twelve ISMAPNG sponsored schools and sets policies, appoints Principals, approves senior leadership positions and fulfils due diligence in the area of finance and audit management, capital development, risk management and litigation.

The College is under the direction of the Bishop of Sandhurst through the CEO Sandhurst as a delegated authority. The CEO acts on organisational, administrative, support and service matters related to Catholic schools within the Diocese.

The College formed in 1984 with the amalgamation of St. Mary's College for girls and

Marist College for boys. It is situated on two sites 9 km apart. Years 7 - 9 are at La Valla on the eastern edge of Bendigo and Years 10 - 12 are at Coolock in the city centre.

Catholic College Bendigo is committed to providing a diverse choice of educational pathways for students. The College provides VCE, VET and VCAL pathways across the senior years of schooling. Within each of these pathways the College aims to provide opportunities for excellence for all students.

The College is structured around five key elements. These elements assist in bringing structure to the operation of a very large and complex secondary college and provide the structure for annual cyclic college review using the Charter of Secondary School Improvement (CoSSI). These areas are:

- Leadership
- Learning & Teaching
- Pastoral Wellbeing
- Stewardship & Resources
- Catholic Identity

As a member of the Catholic Church the College works in partnership with parents to provide a holistic education to enhance the academic, spiritual, physical and emotional development of our young people. The College liaises closely with the nine Catholic primary schools in the area to provide a 13 year journey in Catholic Education.

Each year the staff and students develop a College Theme. The theme, launched annually at the Opening Mass, is used as a focus for the year to assist members of the College community to be true to the ongoing College Motto, Live the Good News. In 2016 the College theme was: 'Opening the Doors of Mercy'.

Principal's Report

When Pope Francis announced the International Year of Mercy he provided a wonderful foundation to complement our 140 Year Celebrations at Catholic College Bendigo. In 2016 we celebrated the arrival of the first Mercy of Sisters to Sandhurst in 1876. The College Theme in 2016 was 'Opening the Doors of Mercy' in keeping with the Pope's message for the Jubilee Year of Mercy. The striking theme banners designed by Teacher, Sharon Cruise, represented the people and heritage that forms our community today.

This year our College enjoyed the company and presence of the many Sisters of Mercy who returned to celebrate the anniversary. Sr. Mary Duffy, former Principal of CCB, reflected on her memories as a student, boarder, Sister and Principal and noted the qualities and values that have always been associated with our community. The qualities that are the foundation and touchstones of our Mercy Values; hospitality, courage, respect, compassion, justice and service.

In listening to the stories that always eventuate at these occasions it is always the characters and relationships that make the community. We thank the Sisters for their support and guidance.

In acknowledging the Mercy Sisters legacy the College also extends its appreciation to the Mercy Education Limited and their staff who provide exceptional professional and pastoral support. It makes a huge difference being a member of the Mercy Congregation and part of that local and international family.

With the support of Fraynework Multimedia, a Mercy organisation, a Heritage Room was created to display and celebrate our College history.

The College commenced 2016 with a new structure. I thank the Leadership team for embracing their roles and embedding the structure and to teachers and support staff who hold the most important relationships with our students.

A new Vision and Mission statement was developed as well as Strategic Directions and annual action plans for each area.

The Martyn Program was introduced at Year 8.

Named after Mother Aloysius Martyn this program provides an integrated and applied focus to learning. The program will be offered at Year 8 and 9 in 2017. Also, a new Music Program was introduced at Year 7. All students are given the opportunity to learn an instrument, in small-group intensive lessons, in addition to their music classes. The changes created challenges and a level of increased work, however, staff have embraced these programs wholeheartedly and the flow on effect with regard student engagement and community involvement has been positive.

New literacy and numeracy roles were introduced and continue to develop in significance and contribution. The College is strongly focused on developing a culture where data and individual profiles are generated and reviewed to ensure a targeted approach to curriculum delivery. A new Learning Management System and Administration package was sourced and will further aide this direction when implemented in 2017.

We were delighted to host the 21st Frayne Speech Festival with more than 200 guests from fourteen Mercy Schools. Our staff and students were particularly appreciative of the opportunity to witness the outstanding individual and team efforts.

We were fortunate to be the recipient of a State Capital Grant of \$1m which will be forthcoming on the completion of a new build at our La Valla site. Master planning has been high on the agenda with finalisation of plans for a new building comprising general purpose learning areas and a music and performing arts hub.

Our College undertook the VRQA Full School Review and Catholic Identity Review. It was a satisfying process of reflection as staff appreciated the chance to document the great things that are occurring and was a successful outcome.

2016 was a year of review for our wellbeing program to ensure that our offerings are reflective of the Mercy Values. The plan is to reflect strong themes of resilience and mindfulness whilst maintaining our already strong sense of belonging. Child Safe Laws were legislated, introduced and embedded in all school policies and practice.

One of the challenges for the College through the next few years is the reduction in enrolments with the introduction of Marist College. Over the next few years we will be losing around one hundred students a year and then consolidating at approximately 1500 students. In order to sustain this change the College has had to reduce the number of teachers and support staff. This difficult situation has been moderated by the wonderful supportive attitude of the staff who have been very open and receptive to meeting and discussing their individual circumstances. A number of staff have accepted a voluntary redundancy this year and others have accepted roles at Marist and other schools. The College would like to thank them for their contributions to our community and wish them well on their retirement or in their future careers.

We bid farewell to several Advisory Council members at the end of 2016. I thank Mrs Allison Bodinnair Mr Paul Bowe and Ms Margaret O'Rourke for their time and contribution to our school community.

Throughout this year, the College community has worked through the process of considering a change of visual identity fitting for our sole Governance as part of ISMAPNG. Fraynework Multimedia assisted with community consultation to identify a new name and develop a new logo and visual identity. 2017 will be a year of transition as we introduce a full transition to become Catherine McAuley College in 2018. I am excited about the future and increasing our ties to the Catherine McAuley legacy and the Sisters of Mercy.

OPENING THE DOORS OF MERCY

The Mercy charism was alive at Catholic College Bendigo in 2016 as we celebrated the Jubilee Year of Mercy with the blessing of Pope Francis and 140 years of Mercy Education in Bendigo. Our community was blessed to celebrate with our Sisters of Mercy their incredible commitment and courage in contributing to 140 years of Mercy Education in the Sandhurst Diocese.

The Year of Mercy Mass in July, was celebrated at the Cathedral, where the Sisters of Mercy were represented in large numbers and it was lovely to have them involved in the choir, readings and Mass proceedings. The talent of the choir echoed through the Cathedral and was beautiful to hear with the inclusion of 'Catherine's Suscipe', an extremely significant hymn for the Sisters. Sr Mary Duffy, a past Principal, provided further insight into their commitment and courage in ensuring Catherine's legacy of education was fulfilled in the Sandhurst Diocese and how the story began with Mother Aloysius Martyn. Following Mass, the Sisters and special guests moved to Coolock where they visited our newly opened Heritage Room.

In recognition of the commitment and dedication of these strong and resilient women, a bronze plaque has been placed in the Chapel at Coolock, which says:

"Every Place has its own particular ideas and feelings which must be yielded to when possible".

Each term saw our community work together to raise funds for Caritas, St Vincent de Paul (Vinnies), Mercy Works and our own local community. This helps create an awareness of different areas in our world where support is needed and is an opportunity to educate our community and encourage their involvement and support. Congratulations and thank you to the students and staff for their ongoing contribution throughout the year.

Mercy Day liturgy was led by the students that was held at Coolock campus where our local Sisters were recognised with a gift and the student leaders and Brian Turner

did a great job of retelling the arrival of the Sisters in Bendigo and their search for 'Pokémon Values' – the Mercy Values. Celebrating Mercy Day is an opportunity to give thanks for our Mercy heritage and the many significant opportunities and events that happen in our community throughout the year.

It is difficult to place a value on the many celebrations and sense of community on days such as Mercy Day and Caritas Ks, which provide such a strong connection to the Mercy values to which we aspire. These days are great opportunities to build both house and school spirit and depend upon the enthusiasm and participation of our students. Learning & Teaching

The College promotes lifelong learning by encouraging independence, initiative and understanding. This approach encourages critical and creative thinking, which benefits the students' learning. It builds resilience and social skills, equipping them to make a meaningful contribution to society.

We are committed to Targeted Learning that allows each student to experience personal success. We construct learner profiles based on individual student data which helps cater for specific learning needs.

Our College has undertaken considerable planning work in 2016 to develop students' 'soft' skills in order to best equip them for the future, including problem solving and presentation skills, critical thinking, personal learning behaviours, research skills and creativity. These skills are core to our planning and curriculum and we will continue to focus on the development of these as we implement learning programs that best cater for our students.

To allow us to understand more about our students and their unique learning skills and needs, we continue to gather as much data as possible. We are strong in our quest to know our students across all areas and believe that it is important for our staff to develop strong, positive relationships with our students. This includes understanding a student's interests and passions, as well as his or her individual learning needs. The latter is the reason for our ongoing testing and development of student profiles. We have made great progress on this front throughout 2016.

In 2016, we launched our Instrumental Music Program at Year 7. All Year 7 students were given the opportunity to learn an instrument, in small-group intensive lessons, in addition to their Music classes. Students could choose to continue with their instrument if they desired and many students did this, triggering the development of the De Sales Concert Band.









NAPLAN TRENDS

The College Year 7 and 9 Naplan trends* remain relatively consistent with previous years. The Literacy and Numeracy needs of our students vary significantly and we seek to cater for our students at their point of need. Our improved capture and understanding of individual student data has allowed us to make considerable investment in targeting students learning. We expect these changes to have a positive effect on our learning outcomes for our students in the years ahead.







Student Wellbeing

With regards to the development of the College's Wellbeing, 2016 was a year of review. A team of twelve, including Learning Enhancement staff, Heads of House, Faith and Mission, Pastoral coordinators and counsellors gathered to look at how we see Wellbeing at Catholic College Bendigo and how that will look going forward. Our 2017 Action Plan should reflect strong themes of resilience and mindfulness whilst maintaining our already strong sense of belonging. House group teachers will remain the first point of contact for parents, as these mentors' absolute focus is every student's connectedness and learning pathway through our College.

The administration of the College is truly a team effort. The management of over 260 staff and the work required to ensure that the school maintains standards with regards to the numerous facets of compliance remains a huge task. This process is, and will always remain, a work in progress as we constantly look for ways of improving the flow of communications and meet new government standards and expectations. The administration team including everyone in the General Office areas, the Coolock Administration building and Coolock House should be thanked for ensuring that we cross all the t's and dot all the i's.

The introduction of the new Child Safe Laws this year certainly changed the landscape for all in education. These new state laws have been introduced with the sole purpose of protecting children and mandating all adults' responsibilities with regard to children's rights to be safe and feel safe. Both students and staff were very accepting of the information presented to them.

The school calendar at Catholic College Bendigo has certainly been jam-packed this year: house community events, the plethora of music and drama performances, the Year 9 production of Grease, camps, Caritas Ks, retreats, the Frayne Festival, 140 years of Mercy Sisters in Sandhurst celebrations, visual arts exhibitions, pancake races, a multitude of sporting activities and two attempts at Mercy Day! Certainly an indication that there are plenty of opportunities for students to become involved and immerse themselves in the culture of Catholic College Bendigo. Absences at a number of these events were down from previous years. There is much evidenced-based research out there indicating that students who engage more fully with the opportunities that are offered to them within their school environment are more likely to succeed, both academically and in forming and maintaining

positive relationships. The support of parents with regards to attendance at all school community events is crucial in the holistic development of their children.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

It is the policy of Catholic College Bendigo:

- To ensure that all students reach their personal, social and academic potential through high levels of daily school attendance
- To ensure that students enrolled at Catholic College Bendigo attend school full-time unless there is an exemption for a child
- Monitor student attendance at least twice a day and in accordance with legislative requirements
- Record the reason for a student's absence
- Enact the Attendance Improvement Procedure should a student's attendance become unsatisfactory

DAILY PROCEDURE

- Step 1: Monitor absentee emails and phone calls and record in First Class
- **Step 2**: Generate report for unmarked classes for House Group and Period 1. Email Teaching staff of the unmarked classes.
- **Step 3**. Notify parents of students who are absent in period House Group and Period 1 (10am)
- **Step 4**. Place "absent parent contacted in period 1". Always display the previous day to see a pattern of illness

ATTENDANCE IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

The following procedure is to be utilised with students who are presenting with difficulties in maintaining their attendance. Attendance should be monitored by Housegroup Teacher/s (HGT), Classroom Teacher/s, and Head of House (HoH), but remains a primary role for Housegroup Teacher. Action should be taken if a student has:

- 3 consecutive absences and/or
- a pattern of one day absence a fortnight and/or
- Absences that amount to 10% of class (per term)
- Repeated absences for assessment tasks or key activities

Key tasks relating to this procedure are as follows:

- General Office is to record reasons offered for absence, send SMS to Parent/guardian, if patterns of absence are identified General Office staff will flag patterns to HGT/HoH for follow up
- HGTs are to accurately maintain the roll, check absentee lists, monitor attendance and
 patterns of absence, consult with students regarding absences, contact Parent/Guardians,
 pass on relevant information to classroom teachers, flag ongoing issues with HoH for follow
 up, advise General Office if Parent/guardian have indicated reason so that records can be
 maintained

- HoH are to liaise with HGT regarding calls to parent/guardian, to monitor absentee lists and flag issues with HGT, contact home and offer school supports/referrals (i.e. CALD, Wellbeing where appropriate), contact family for ongoing issues, facilitate Attendance Improvement Meetings, send formal letter when necessary

Child Safe Standards



Catholic College Bendigo is committed to a safe and nurturing culture for all children and young people.

At Catholic College Bendigo (CCB), we have a moral, legal and mission-driven responsibility to create nurturing school environments where children and young people are respected, their voices are heard and where they are safe and feel safe. We are resolutely committed to ensuring that all those who are engaged at CCB promote the inherent dignity of children and young people and the fundamental right to be respected and nurtured in a safe school environment. This is particularly so for the most vulnerable children, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from and/or culturally linguistically diverse backgrounds, and children with a disability.

When allegations of abuse concerning children and young people are raised, CCB will take prompt action to have these appropriately referred and investigated. While the context and reality at CCB will differ from other schools, the fundamental issues of understanding effective practices in child safety and identifying and responding to child harm remain the same. CCB strives for continual improvement that is responsive to emerging thinking, evidence and practice, so as to eliminate the possibility of abuse occurring in the first place.

Creating child-safe school environments is a process that involves active dynamic participation and responsibility by the College, families and their communities. It is marked by collaboration, vigilance and proactive approaches across policies, procedures, curriculum and practices.

Leadership & Management - Coolock

NEW IDENTITY AND CREST



The new College design was based on focus group feedback from all stakeholder groups which were strongly in favour of the retention of a crest.

Emphasis was given to the Mercy cross to signify that the College is now a fully sponsored Mercy school and belongs to the Mercy Education network. The change of name also reflects the Mercy charism as does the motto 'Living Mercy'.

The golden wattle is the floral emblem of Australia and the incorporation of the Whirrakee wattle in the new logo is particular to the Bendigo region and well recognised in the local area.

NEW BUILDING PROJECTS

New building developments at the College will create modern, cutting-edge facilities and the new learning spaces are designed to enhance our students' skills and educational pathways, today and well into the future.

A purpose-built performing and creative arts centre including 28 flexible learning spaces will add to the established specialist facilities such as science laboratories and technology areas for food, wood and metal classes. Our students love the wide open spaces of La Valla, with the ovals, natural bush, the farm and McAuley Square.

STRONG PARTNERSHIPS

Our College has strong partnerships with peak sporting bodies allowing us to develop our grounds and sporting facilities with the support of the City of Greater Bendigo. 
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
