### Welcome

Welcome to our inaugural newsletter as Catherine McAuley College and to the 2018 school year.

Last Thursday we had two major whole school

celebrations. It was fitting that our Opening Mass was a whole community celebration held in the Cathedral. Many of the guests have had a long and continuous association with our College and a stake in helping create this landmark occasion. In the years and decades to come people will remember this significant day and year.

At the Laureate Assembly we recognized the outstanding individual successes of our Catholic College Bendigo graduates of 2017.

### **Catherine McAuley College**

At the Opening Mass in 2016 we celebrated 140 years since the Mercy Sisters arrived in Sandhurst.

At this same mass last year, in 2017, it was announced that we would be transitioning to our new name.

Since then there has been lots of planning and preparation and we thank everyone across the community for your support and flexibility change is not always easy.

The beginning of this year is another significant step in our history. Like all changes it is based on research, a dedicated process and a range of people. No one sends a child straight to school for the first time - to Year 7, to an apprenticeship or university - without preparation. Changing the school name is a similar journey and takes hundreds of hours and many contributors. But why would we change?

The purpose of this change is for clarity. To distinguish what we stand for, to establish and genuinely adopt the story of the Venerable Catherine McAuley and the ongoing role that the Sisters of Mercy have held in our community for generations and still hold.

It is not a cosmetic change of image, a rebrand made on a whim; it is about knowing the Mercy story and charism and animating that story in our lives. If there was ever a time and context where we all need strong associations, stories and values steeped in the Catholic faith and tradition to help quide us, it is now.

### **New Campus Names**

At the start of this year, we have ensured that we are true to the story of Catherine McAuley in recognising the Coolock Campus is now out of town, as Coolock House was in Catherine's time and life. It might be confusing in the moment but when we know the story, it makes sense.

We have also acknowledged our own local Mercy story and returned our Barkly St Campus to the name St Mary's, the name by which it was known from 1897 to 1983 - another part of the story.

On behalf of Catherine McAuley College, I thank Bishop Leslie and the Diocese for their support of the new name.

### LAUREATE ASSEMBLY



We celebrated our second annual Laureate Assembly last week.

This special event provided an opportunity to recognise the outstanding academic achievements of students who studied VCAL, VET and VCE through 2017.

This celebration took place in front of the entire student body, and families of Laureate Award recipients. We believe there is great power in our younger students looking to their older peers, and in aspiring to achieve as they did in a wide range of disciplines. It also provides the opportunity to recognise the diversity of talents across the cohort.

Subject Dux awards were presented in recognition of outstanding achievements in Unit 3 & 4 VCE classes to those who achieved a study score of 35 and above, and were the highest score in their course. Subject Dux awards were also presented to students who achieved outstanding results in their Religious Education classes and VET and VCAL classes.

All in attendance were challenged by the inspired speeches of our 2017 College Dux Jessica McCarthy, and 2006 Dux Kate Tehan (formally Katherine Boggon May). Both addressed the assembly with an air of humility and grace, while also challenging all to do their best, and to try to make a difference in the world. These messages were well received by our students, and the significance of these words coming from their peers was not lost on any.

The assembly was fittingly concluded with a stunning performance by Year 11 student and accomplished bagpiper Emily Earl (MY7). At the end of 2017 we celebrated the excellent VCE results of our students for 2017. The students were rewarded for their endeavours with some outstanding collective and individual performances in both the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) and Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) studies.

The Catholic College Bendigo Dux for 2017 was Jessica McCarthy, with an ATAR of 98.55.

The Dux Proximus was Imogen Sexton with an ATAR of 97.95, followed by Lillian Maher with an ATAR of 97.9.

Speaking about their achievements, Principal Brian Turner said "Congratulations to Jessica, Imogen and Lillian. They have shown great dedication with their strong work ethic and thoroughness in their approach to all subjects. They have demonstrated a humble approach to their achievements and are highly-respected by their peers and staff. Jessica, Imogen and Lillian have modelled our College's Mercy Values over the past six years. Their praxis has been evident in all aspects of College life, they have all made an enormous contribution to our school."

Jessica was the 2017 Musician of the Year and performed at the College Presentation Evening. Imogen received the Ledwidge Medal, our Best and Fairest award, for her contribution to the Senior Netball Team who were state runners up in the School Sport Victoria competition. On the day results came out Lillian heard that she had been awarded a Vice-Chancellor's Academic Excellence Scholarship to Deakin University.

We also congratulate Year 11 student Joshua Hamilton achieved a perfect study score of 50 in Further Mathematics.

Whilst the focus is often on the high-achieving students, it is important to recognize the great work done by all students in Year 12. In our commitment to service in the Mercy tradition we believe that our results offer a range of pathways, and we celebrate not only the excellent results achieved by our VCE students, but also the students who completed their Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) with an outstanding pass rate. This will open doors for them to many pathways.

### **OPENING MASS**

### LIVING MERCY

At Catherine McAuley College we are excited by the challenge of **Living Mercy** and upholding the values and teachings of the Mercy charism. Is this any different now we have a new name? - she helped people believe in themselves
- she believed in making people independent
- she had the ability to challenge people and she demanded high standards
- Catherine believed in flexibility and diversity and believed in a form of leadership that was relational.

Catherine was also a leader in education, reaching out to the children of the poor and the women in Dublin, giving them independence and skills for the future. May we also be leaders in our learning, as lifelong learners "impelled to thrive and serve".

At World Youth Day (WYD) in 2016 **Pope Francis** declared that 2018 would be the Year of Youth. The theme is **Open New Horizons for Spreading Joy**. Pope Francis invited young people to "have courage and to follow Jesus... which requires a pair of walking shoes to set out on new and unchartered paths... to blaze trails that open up new horizons capable of spreading joy". To take the path of the "craziness" of our God, who teaches us to encounter him in the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the sick, the friend in trouble, the prisoner, the refugee and the migrant, and our neighbours who feel abandoned. ### SUCCESSFUL READERS

### RENAISSANCE READING PROGRAM

### Helping your child to read and achieve more.

The Renaissance Reading program develops successful readers by:

- evaluating students' reading abilities
- motivating them to read more at appropriately challenging levels.

### AT SCHOOL

- Each student undertakes a classroombased reading test to determine their lexile (reading) level.
- When students read books appropriate to their lexile level, they can read with confidence and control. Material is challenging without being frustrating or boring.
- Students are helped to create a personal list of recommended books reflecting their lexile measure and reading interests.
- Students begin most of their classes with 5 -7 minutes of reading targeted at their level of comprehension.

- After reading a book, they do a comprehension quiz.
- Teachers track the reading of each student through quizzes and lexile tests throughout the year.
- Classroom incentives keep students working toward their reading goals.


### AT HOME

### You can support your child's reading by:

- Encouraging them to read for 20 minutes a day.
- Helping choose books on a variety of topics, fiction and non-fiction.
- Encouraging your child to be organised and have their reading material with them each day.
- Discussing the books that they are reading.
- Keeping track of new vocabulary, using new words in conversation and writing.
- Using a dictionary and providing context clues for unfamiliar words.

### **OUTDOOR EDUCATION**

### UNIT 3 OUTDOOR AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

During week 2, the Unit 3 OES students took part in their first Outdoor and Environmental Studies camp for 2018. Melbourne was the destination where students learnt to explore a variety of historical perspectives in relation to how humans have perceived, interacted and impacted the natural environment in this region. Over the course of the camp the students were required to bike ride through Melbourne to each destination. On the first day, students walked through the Murundaka wetlands to look at the evidence of Indigenous custodianship close to Melbourne. The second activity for the day was river sledding on the Yarra River with the highlight being floating through Pound Bend Tunnel to examine the impacts of the goldrush in Warrandyte.

The second day was spent with Melbourne Walks owner Meyer looking at Aboriginal heritage along Merri Creek while reflecting how the early settlers had a very different approach towards the landscape. Students were required to explore the impact that European settlement had on the traditional custodians of the land and their way of life. This talk allowed us to experience and see Aboriginal bush tucker, plants that were used as cotton buds and hair brushes, stones that were used for carving canoes from gum trees and tools, paints and how they made them, possum skin used for clothing and how to build huts for shelter. After a big day we travelled to the Collingwood's Children's Farm where we set up camp for the second night. The next day we rode all the way into the city looking at the impacts of industrialisation while also examining specific buildings and bridges that have been built more recently and the purpose for their construction. A National Gallery of Victoria tour allowed students to look at paintings of Australia's history and culture and how its changed over the years. This helped summarise the knowledge learnt throughout the trip. It was then time to hop back on the bikes and ride to our destination, St Kilda Beach where we packed up and headed home for Bendigo. Overall this camp gave the students a rich and diverse knowledge of the history of human relationships and the evidence that represents these relationships over time.

### VOLUNTEERING TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Year 11 VCAL Trade students attended Eaglehawk Rememberance Park to volunteer their time and efforts in maintaining the grounds of the park whilst learning valuable vocational and horticultural skills.

Students received a talk from the park's resident Gravedigger, Brad. He spoke regarding the choices that led him to enter the vocation of Gravedigging, also the vast amount of Occupational Health and Safety involved in safely performing his job. Students also learned about the range of tools Brad employs, such as backhoes and laser finders. Lastly, discussion regarding qualifications needed to enter the profession.



Neil, Eaglehawk Rememberance Park's resident horticulturalist, spoke at length to the students regarding the variety of plants at the cemetery, and the lengths to which he goes to ensure they survive the Bendigo summer. Neil advocated regular mulching, particularly after the spring rains, and choosing hardy, drought resistant plants after the recent drought some years ago. During their excursion, students participated in garden maintenance, pruning plants and assisting mulching and removing leaf litter. MR MATHEW CANTERFORD

### TOP CLASS DRAMA

Each year the Year 12 Drama students who achieve an A+ for their Solo Performance Exam are invited to audition for Top Class Drama, a prestigious series of performances showcasing the very best Solo Performance Exams from the previous year. This year, we are very proud that three of our 2017 Year 12 graduates received this great honour; Mason Clarke, Jacob Darlow and Katie McMillan.

Mason Clarke's character (pictured top right) of The Storyteller used the song, From Little Things, Big things Grow as inspiration, exploring the Wave Hill Walk-Off and the first legislation allowing Indigenous Australians to claim land title, while using pathos and symbol.

Jacob Darlow (pictured centre right) developed the fictional character of *The Pilgrim*, derived from the stimulus *Monkey*, a whacky 1970's Japanese television show. Jacob used the style of magic realism, to depict The Pilgrim's attempts to prove himself so he can return to heaven.

From all those who auditioned in Victoria, Katie Mc Millan was one of the few who were selected to be part of the Top Class Drama performances for 2018.

For her solo performance, Katie (pictured bottom right) chose from the ten prescribed structures settling on the character of Mrs Sarah Siddons, a real person who was one of the leading actors in the sole performance of Vortigern and Rowena, a play believed to be a long-lost Shakespearean text, but that was soon revealed as a fake and forgery. This solo included aspects of Comedy of Manners, a style of performance ridiculing the customs and social conventions of members of the upper class, with heightened use of movement and language also prescribed.

Katie's leadership, enthusiasm and talent in Drama has been an inspiration to many other Drama students, and through her performance at Top Class Drama she will continue to inspire Drama students from across the state. We look forward to Katie's performance of Mrs Sarah Siddons as part of the VCE Season of Excellence in mid-March and congratulate her on her outstanding achievement.

### **CAREERS NEWS**

### WELCOME BACK FROM THE CAREERS TEAM

Welcome back to school. I hope you had a restful break and are feeling energised and motivated for the year ahead. If you haven't read the Career News before, I encourage you to take 5 minutes each week to read it. The 'News' contains information about:

- Tertiary (e.g., university) and vocational (e.g., TAFE) courses and institutions
- Apprenticeships and traineeships
- Focus articles on courses and occupations, and
- Upcoming career events.

I also encourage you to focus on your career development this year. This will assist you to develop post school plans in terms of courses you may like study or occupations you may like to pursue. Career development activities may include:

- Attending tertiary and vocational institution open days
- Undertaking experience days at Universities
- Volunteering for a leadership position at school or in the community
- Undertaking community service
- Playing sport or engaging in hobbies
- Reading through university and TAFE course guides, and exploring the myfuture website
- Completing a vocational assessment
- Speaking to past students of the College who are studying, training or working in an area you are interested in (e.g. building, law).
- Meeting with Mrs Dickson or Mr Goode in regards to Work Experience or Mrs Duckett for Structured Workplace Learning placements.
- Meeting with Mr Goode or Mrs Dickson at Coolock or St Mary's for a career counselling interview

These are only a small number of examples. You develop career ideas through exposure to things like the media, speaking to people, engaging in any of the above and often you come up with career ideas through chance encounters. Reading the Career News will also assist you to develop career ideas. I hope you enjoy reading the updates.

### Year 12 Class of 2017 Pathways

Last year's 2017 cohort have gone on to pursue a range of pathways. Some have gone on to apprenticeships (plumbing, carpentry, automotive...), traineeships (business, finance...), further TAFE training (nursing, IT) and full time work. Others have sought gap years. We had 208 Year 12 students offered a tertiary place through VTAC into an amazing 88 different courses between them. These were offered at a large range of institutions. The most popular was La Trobe University, followed by Deakin, RMIT, Melbourne Uni, Monash, Swinburne Uni, Federation Uni, and ACU.

The areas of interest that student movement into tertiary education are as follows:

- Agriculture, environment & related studies: 20
- Architecture and Building: 39
- Creative Arts: 39
- Education: 31
- Engineering: 23
- Food, Hospitality and Personal Services: 1
- Health: 113
- Information Technology : 17
- Management and Commerce: NA
- Natural and Physical Sciences: 80
- Society and Culture: 108

Of the offers that went out, 55% obtained their first preference, 69% obtained their first or second preference, 77% obtained their first, second or third preference. As we encourage students to put their 'dream' preference as 'Number One' many students were very pleased with their offers (with SEAS and Subject Bonuses making the number of first preferences higher too).

Congratulations to all Year 12s of 2017 and we look forward to working with Year 12s this year as they transition into the next stage of their life.

### Sitting the UMAT? Applying for Medicine?

If you are, you may need to sit the Undergraduate Medical Admissions Test (UMAT).

This is a three-part test that you sit in July 2018 and selected universities use your UMAT score as part of the selection process, in conjunction with your ATAR and in some cases an interview.

You will be tested on the following- logical reasoning and problem solving, understanding people and non-verbal reasoning.

You will only have one chance to sit the UMAT this year- the test will be held Wednesday 25 July. You must be in Year 12 and you must register online to sit the test by 5pm Friday 1 June.

You have the choice to start preparing for the test early. There are several private companies who offer commercial preparation programs – www. nie.edu.au/ and www.medentry.edu.au/ are examples.

It is important to note that the universities who use the UMAT do not endorse any of these companies and you will receive free preparation materials once you register for the test (registration is now open).



Ben Hann was then introduced with immediate effect as he took the first wicket with a brilliant ball that went right through the batters defense with the score on 21. Vlaeminck then got in on the act with the next over taking his first wicket. Hann continued to be a menace with the ball finishing with the figures of 3 for 13 off his 4 overs. Nick Gladman was also impressive as he claimed 2 wickets. Girton made steady progress over their 20 overs but with the steady fall of wickets their final total of 98 seemed very reachable for our boys.

The batting innings however did not the start the way the boys had wanted as Vlaeminck was out for just 4 in the second over. It was then Gladman and Clohesy who took control of the match with both batsman displaying some impressive skills and hitting. ### GAME 2 vs BSSC - FINAL

The boys again lost the toss and had to bowl, but the line and length early on was very impressive as James Vlaeminck took a wicket in the first over followed by Nick Gladman pulling in a blinder of a catch in his first over as well. Senior were then subdued for the next few overs as they regrouped, but as they passed the half way mark they decided to go big. The attack went on for the next 5 overs until the vital breakthrough was made by a ripping first up ball from Blake Barri. Vlaeminck then continued with that momentum taking 2 wickets in the next over finishing with the impressive figures of 3 for 25. O'Farrell was imposing as he took 2 for 15, and the boys had slowed the onslaught and finished off the innings well but the 157 run total posted by Senior was going to be tough to chase.

The opening pair of O'Farrell and Vlaeminck started impressively as they ticked off the runs at a steady rate. The unlucky run out of O'Farrell with the score on 42 saw the determined Captain Daniel Clohesy stride to the crease with purpose. This pairing continued on at a good rate building the total but sadly, Vlaeminck went in the air once too often and was caught for 40. Gladman could not repeat his run fest from game one and went cheaply for just 1. It was now a vital time of the match and as the boys sat at 3 for 76 with only 8 overs to go they really needed to get going. Riley McIvor and Daniel Clohesy did just that as the run rate escalated, until the wicket of Clohesy came in the 17th over with the score on 128. The win was still achievable, but keeping wickets in hand would be the key. Kyle Symons flicked a ripping 6 off his pads and was looking good, but then his partner Mclvor holed out for 31 and the task just got a little more difficult. Burke went for just 4 and when the big hitting Symons went running for his life only to be caught short, that left our 2 big hitters of Bakes and Barri at the crease. They both worked the ball well into the gaps but unfortunately it was



not enough and the boys finished an agonizing 5 for 151 – just 7 runs short of what would have been a memorable victory. It was a fantastic match, with lots of highlights as it went right to the final ball. Congratulations to all the boys on a great effort.

  - c. Submit an application to the school by the due date.
