We acknowledge and respect that the land we live, learn and play on is traditionally owned by the Djaara People of the Kulin Nation.



- School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SBAT).

This flexible approach ensures that each student can pursue a path aligned with their individual interests and future ambitions.

At CMCB, students benefit from a broad range of study choices, more independence, and more responsibility, empowering them to take ownership of their learning journey.

Acceleration

Acceleration enables students to complete six VCE/VET subjects, all of which contribute to their ATAR, compared to the traditional five subjects typically studied in Year 12.









Subject Selection

Extensive support and intervention are provided, as well as a wide range of opportunities designed to expand students' thinking and assist them in making informed choices about their educational and career pathways. See page 9.

Career Planning

Career planning is initiated through guided subject selection and is further supported by expert advice from the College's professionally qualified careers practitioners. See page 11.

Extra help

Help clubs are available for each subject, run during lunchtime and after school. These sessions are optional and are offered by teachers who are genuinely invested in students' success.



Wellbeing

A structured and collaborative support system of teachers with learning leaders strengthens the partnership with home to support individual student needs, recognise achievements and provide targeted assistance. This cohesive team is dedicated to knowing each student and responding to their unique needs. The morning routine - including prayer, acknowledgement, and administrative tasks - takes place during the first classroom session of the day.

Additional support is provided by a comprehensive Allied Health Team, which includes a Psychologist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Counsellors, Koorie Education Workers and Multicultural Education Aide.

Subject Selection Support

Students have input into their subject choices from as early as Year 8. The subject selection process forms an important step in the CMCB educational journey, guiding students towards future learning pathways and career opportunities.

Supported by teachers, careers practitioners, and their parents/carers, students are encouraged to select subjects that align with their interests, strengths and goals, in a staged approach that encourages self-reflection and informed decision-making.

By thorough engagement in subject selection, students can create a meaningful and personalised learning experience that builds a strong foundation for success in their senior years and beyond.

Subject Selection Evening

Students going into Year 10, the VCE and VCE Vocational Major, with their parents and carers, are invited to visit displays, discuss their programs with teachers and attend the relevant information session.

Planning for Year 10

In Year 9, classroom pathway sessions are scheduled during Term 2 to help prepare students for the subject selection process. Students are also invited to attend the Subject Selection Evening with their parents and carers.

- 3. Preparing students for subject selection

Individual Pathway Counselling

Following these, each Year 9 student participates in a compulsory individual pathway counselling meeting with their parents/carers early in Term 3.

Planning for VCE

As part of the preparation for commencing VCE, all Year 10 students receive guidance to explore their interests and consider their future pathways through:

- Fortnightly career planning assemblies
- Subject information sessions
- Subject Selection Evening
- Individual pathways counselling meeting.

Careers Expo

Each year, CMCB hosts a comprehensive Careers Expo Evening featuring over 50 exhibitors, including representatives from Victorian universities, TAFE institutions, industry experts, local businesses and trades, employment services, and the creative industries. This event provides students with valuable insights and networking opportunities to help shape their future pathways.

Careers Support

Careers support at CMCB is delivered through an embedded careers curriculum, dedicated assemblies, group workshops and individual appointments ensuring students receive consistent and relevant guidance throughout their senior years. Recognising the importance of career education and counselling for all young people, the College follows the Victorian Careers Curriculum Framework. This framework provides a structured progression from Year 7 to Year 12 in career

learning, tailored to meet the needs of students at every stage of their development.





CMCB Career Tools Website

The Career Tools website is a comprehensive student-focused website designed to support the delivery of the CMCB Careers program. It provides access to general careers information, engaging videos, and insights into the "how, what and why" of various professions.

With guidance from the College, students will build their own individual careers website, tailored to their interests and goals. This personalised site is filled with valuable resources - from financial planning advice to career-building strategies - empowering students to take ownership of their future.



Study Support

Elevate Study Skills Program

Within the classroom, the College has implemented the Elevate Education study skills program, grounded in seventeen years of global research into student performance. Elevate has identified the habits that distinguish top-performing students, and its seminars and resources are designed to help students of all abilities adopt these habits. This leads to more effective learning outcomes and improves overall academic performance. Students sequence through all of the program across Years 11 and 12.

Assemblies

To further support students, CMCB offers fortnightly assemblies at each senior year level. These sessions focus on career planning and study skills, ensuring students are well-informed and equipped to make confident decisions about their future.

The assemblies are led by students and also provide shared time together as a community. They are a forum to celebrate student achievements, birthdays and discuss year level events.

Headstart

At the conclusion of the academic year, CMCB runs a two-week Headstart program designed to prepare students for the year ahead. During this program, students begin their next academic year early, allowing them to become familiar with the expectations, content, and structure of their upcoming subjects. This proactive approach helps ease the transition and sets a strong foundation for academic success.

Revision

The College offers students a wide range of access to revision exams, providing valuable opportunities to consolidate their learning, practise exam techniques, and build confidence ahead of formal assessments.

Exam Support

The College runs a practice VCE Exam schedule during the September school holidays as a final preparation for students. These are coordinated and supported by VCE teachers and senior staff.

Special Provision

If it can be demonstrated that student achievement in an exam will be adversely affected, they may be eligible for special exam adjustments and arrangements will be made by the Pastoral Care Director.

Scholarship guidance

Careers Practitioners assist students with scholarship applications.

Employment opportunities

Local employers in a wide range of industries regularly reach out to the CMCB Careers Team, when looking for casual, part time, or full time employees and apprentices. Students can access promotion of current local vacancies.





Study Scores and Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking (ATAR)

Students at CMCB receive both group sessions and individual counselling to help them understand how study scores are calculated and why they matter. These sessions explain how study scores reflect student performance relative to others across the state, offering insight into how scores are distributed on a scale from 0 to 50.

The College ensures that students are well-informed about the broader context of study score calculation, helping them interpret their results and understand how these scores contribute to their ATAR and future opportunities.

Change of preferences

Students can change their university course preferences between offer rounds as many times as they wish.

After VCE results are released, the Careers Team offer support and counselling to Year 12 students who may want to change their preferences.

Pathways Support

Learning job-related skills in real-world settings.



Work Experience

Through work exposure, students are able to explore potential future career pathways and gain valuable insight into the options available to them, supporting more informed and confident decision-making about their futures.

Work experience plays a vital role in helping students understand the evolving nature of the workforce, the differences between various occupations and industries, and the skills and personal qualities required for success in both work and life. It offers students the chance to identify and practise these skills in diverse environments, reinforcing the relevance and importance of their ongoing learning.

Structured Workplace Learning

Some courses at CMCB include compulsory work placements as part of their curriculum. In particular, Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses require students to complete at least one week of work placement per year in an industry relevant to their course. The Careers Team and VET teachers guide and encourage students in their choices. Placements are organised by the College to provide students with the opportunity to learn and practise specific, job-related skills in real-world settings.

School Based Apprenticeships & Traineeships (SBATs)

Apprenticeships and traineeships at CMCB combine practical, hands-on experience in the workplace with formal training and assessment toward a VET qualification. A school-based apprenticeship or traineeship allows students to simultaneously engage in school, paid work, and VET studies.

Students typically spend at least one day with their employer, while the remainder of their time is spent at school.

As a school-based apprentice or trainee, students:

- have paid part-time work
- work towards completing Year 12
- can access additional support for their studies
- work towards a nationally recognised qualification.

Tertiary Education

Students who wish to go on to further study, such as university or Technical and Further Education (TAFE) are supported by the College with the application process.



VTAC support

CMCB offers individual and dedicated support for Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) applications.

VTAC is an independent, shared admissions service that facilitates access to tertiary education and further study opportunities and pathways for learners in Victoria and beyond. It serves as a central application point, streamlining the process of gaining entry into courses for both students and tertiary institutions.

The College also supports students with interstate applications.











Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) Applications

If a student has experienced circumstances that have affected their studies, CMCB provides support in considering an application for equity schemes and scholarships.

They enable institutions to take into account the impact of personal circumstances when making selection decisions and allows for special consideration for course entry.

USI application

Anyone undertaking education or training with a provider outside the school system is required to have a Unique Student Identifier (USI). CMCB supports students in applying for a USI.

This reference number creates an online record of the student's training and qualifications attained in Australia. A USI is essential for eligibility to receive a qualification or statement of attainment.

The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) is the certificate that students in Victoria receive on satisfactory completion of their secondary education. The VCE provides diverse pathways to further study or training at university or TAFE and to employment.

The CMCB approach to learning and teaching focuses on transferable skills and life beyond school. With forty VCE and VM subjects to choose from and fourteen VET certificates there are a wide range of subjects and pathways to further study, apprenticeships and employment.

Year 10 Program Structure

Learning at the senior campus, St Mary's, begins in Year 10. Students have the opportunity to diversify their programs, with a range of subject options, allowing them to explore their personal interests and develop their skills further in their areas of passion and interest.

In Year 10, students study seven subjects per semester. These are broken down into core and elective blocks.

Core

Students select from the following:

- 1 English core subject per semester
- 1 Mathematics choice per semester
- Year 10 Religion and Society Unit 1 or iGEN per semester

Electives

- Students then complete 4 elective subjects each semester.
- We encourage students to select one VCE or VET acceleration subject for the full year, and to select a diverse range of elective subjects from different learning areas from the Year 10 elective list. Students may choose to instead select 2 additional elective subjects in Year 10.

Year 10 iGEN: Intergenerational Learning

In partnership with Mercy Health, Australian Catholic University (ACU) and Mercy Education, CMCB and Mercy Health Bethlehem Home for the Aged have developed the iGEN program which offers a unique opportunity for Year 10 students and aged care residents.

The students participate in an innovative intergenerational program designed to develop a range of personal and life skills that will enhance opportunities and pathways for the future. The engagement and connection between the residents and students enriches their lives and contributes to improved understanding of how positive relationships can impact health and wellbeing.



Year 11 Program Structure

In designing their individual program at CMCB, the expectation at Year 11 is:

- Students undertake 12 14 VCE or VCE VET units for the year including 2 units of English and 1 unit of Religious Education over the year. Students would usually select sequenced units in their subjects to achieve the 12 - 14 units required.
- All students undertake Unit 2 Religion and Society for the duration of the year.

Year 12 Program Structure

In designing their individual program at CMCB, the expectation at Year 12 is:


- Students undertake 10 VCE or VCE VET Units 3 and 4 subjects, including 2 units of English and an accepted Religious Education subject for the year.
- Students select 5 Units 3 and 4 subjects to complete for the year. These must be a sequence.

All students within a Year 12 VCE program are required to select one of the following Religious Education subject options:

- Units 3 and 4 VCE Religion and Society. This selection is included as one of the 5 Units 3 and 4 subjects to be completed for the year. Year 12 students undertaking this option will have two study lines for the entire year.
- Students select the school-based Religious Education option, Living Mercy, for Semester 1. Students undertaking this option will have one study line during Semester 1 and move to two study lines for Semester 2.

VCE Vocational Major

The VCE Vocational Major (VM) is a vocational and applied learning program within the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), designed to be completed over a minimum of two years. It offers students choice and flexibility to pursue their strengths and interests while developing the skills and capabilities needed to succeed in further education, employment, and life.

The VCE VM prepares students for a range of post-school pathways, including apprenticeships, traineeships, further education and training, university (via non-ATAR pathways), or direct entry into the workforce.

This pathway provides students with the best opportunity to achieve their personal goals and aspirations in a rapidly-changing world by equipping them with the skills, knowledge, values, and capabilities to become active and informed citizens, lifelong learners, and confident, creative individuals. It empowers them to make informed decisions about their future through real-life workplace experiences.

Applied learning is central to the VCE VM. It teaches skills and knowledge in the context of real-life experiences, allowing students to learn by doing, experiencing, and applying their skills in practical, meaningful ways.



Completing the VCE Vocational Major

To be eligible for the VCE Vocational Major, students must satisfactorily complete a minimum of 16 units, including:

- 3 VCE VM Literacy or VCE English units (including a Unit 3/4 sequence)
- 2 VCE VM Numeracy or VCE Mathematics
- 2 VCE VM Work Related Skills units
- 2 VCE VM Personal Development Skills units, and
- 2 VET credits at Certificate II level or above (180 nominal hours).

As part of the VCE VM program, students must complete a minimum of three other Unit 3/4 sequences. Units 3 and 4 of VM studies may be undertaken together over the academic year to allow for integrated learning experiences.

Students have the flexibility to include other VCE studies and VET programs in their course plan and may also receive structured workplace learning recognition. Most students will complete between 16 to 20 units over the two-year duration of the program.

It's important to note that students will not receive a Study Score for VCE VM subjects. The only external assessments applicable are the General Achievement Test (GAT) and any scored VCE VET programs a student may undertake.

VCE Vocational Education and Training

The College partners with Bendigo Senior Secondary College and Bendigo TAFE to form a consortium that offers a broad range of Vocational Education and Training (VET) Certificates.

VET programs are vocational studies approved by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) as suitable for senior secondary students. These programs equip students with practical skills and industry-specific knowledge. The certificates earned through VET are recognised industry qualifications, with many providing preapprenticeship training.

By including a VET subject in their study plan, students can achieve both their VCE and a nationally recognised industry qualification. In addition to preparing students for direct entry into the workforce, VET programs can lead to further study, including credit towards future VET certificates or university courses. Results from some VET programs may also contribute to the calculation of a student's ATAR score.

Students also have the option to pursue VET qualifications full-time or in combination with employment after leaving school.
